Husband charged in wife's slaying

MILWAUKEE (AP) — A white commercial oil salesman who told police two black men attacked him and his wife outside a restaurant was charged Tuesday with fatally stabbing her at least 21 times in the face and upper body.

Jesse Anderson, 34, of the town of Cedarburg, was charged with first-degree intentional homicide in the death of Barbara Anderson, 33, Police Chief Philip Arreola said at an afternoon news conference.

Arreola declined to discuss a motive for the slaying. A police source confirmed earlier that there was a \$250,000 life insurance policy on Barbara Anderson.

Arreola read from a criminal complaint that outlined how Anderson initially told police that he and Barbara Anderson were attacked by two black men the night of April 21 in the parking lot outside TGI Friday's restaurant near a north-west side shopping center. Barbara Anderson also was white.

Anderson told officers he had knocked a Los Angeles Clippers cap off one of the attackers and that he pulled a red-handled fishing knife from his chest as help arrived from inside the restaurant.

Barbara Anderson died of com-

plications of stab wounds to the brain two days later, Milwaukee County Medical Examiner Jeffrey Jentzen said. She never regained consciousness after the attack, hospital officials said.

Two men who connected Jesse Anderson to the hat and knife called police after the items were shown during TV reports about the slaying.

"Without the information supplied, the investigation would have been much more difficult and lengthy," Arreola said.

The criminal complaint said Tommie Myles identified the Clippers cap found at the scene as the one he sold for \$20 to Anderson at a shopping center the day before the slaying. Two other people, Myles' friend, Wanda Jackson, and Dennis Schmutzler, a mall employee, told police they witnessed the sale of the cap.

James DeShazer, owner of a Milwaukee sporting goods store, told police he sold the fishing knife to Anderson a month before the stabbing, the complaint said. Detectives determined there was no other store in the area that carried such a knife.

On 4/29/92, ANDERSON was formerly charged by the District Attorney's Office, Milwaukee, Wisconsin, with First Degree Murder in the death of his wife.

SYNOPSIS: On 4/21/92, JESSE MICHAEL ANDERSON advised that he and his wife were assaulted by two unidentified black males as they left the TGI FRIDAY'S restaurant at 8901 North 76th Street, Milwaukee, Wisconsin. It was reported that this occurred at approximately 10:20 p.m. Police units arriving at the scene found JESSE ANDERSON to have suffered two minor stab wounds to his chest and two hesitation wounds, and his wife, BARBARA E. ANDERSON to have suffered 21 stab wounds to her body, 19 to the upper facial area. She was transported to a local hospital where life support equipment was removed at the request of JESSE ANDERSON. Subsequent investigation by the Milwaukee Police Department (MPD), determined that [REDACTED]

DETAILS: On 4/27/92, Lieutenant [redacted] of the Milwaukee Wisconsin Police Department, 414/935-7176, requested the assistance of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), in particularly the Behavioral Science Unit, with regard to a current investigation being handled by the Homicide Unit of the Milwaukee Wisconsin Police Department. [redacted] advised that the investigation into the death of BARBARA E. ANDERSON, who was assaulted on 4/21/92, raised numerous inconsistencies and suspicions regarding the circumstances as reported by her husband. Specifically, Lieutenant [redacted] requested a assessment of this crime scene as to the possibility of it being a staged or false allegation matter setup by her husband to cover his wife's death.

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On this date, SA [redacted] met with the detectives assigned to the investigation, and received from them photographs and other reports necessary for the analysis to be conducted.

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VICTIMOLOGY

Victim in this matter is BARBARA E. ANDERSON, a white female, date of birth 12/9/58. BARBARA ANDERSON has been married to JESSE ANDERSON since March, 1985, but had known him for nine years, having met him in Alton, Illinois. She is the president of OLYMPIC OIL CORPORATION, a corporation formed by her husband to enable him to obtain minority contracts. She does not work in this business, but is a housewife, extremely active in civic organizations, including Big Brothers and Big Sisters. This victim is known throughout the community as a very caring and concerned mother, and is known personally by several of the agents of the Milwaukee Office. They all report her to be a very active and concerned citizen, and never heard any gossip or derogatory statements with regard to her. Approximately one year ago, BARBARA ANDERSON lost a younger brother who was killed as a result of traffic accident and according to her husband, had been somewhat despondent after allegedly her younger brother TERRY told her that [redacted] BARBARA ANDERSON's activities revolved around her family, her civic obligations, and a group of friends who had the nickname of the Strawberry Daiquiri Group. This was a group of women who would meet occasionally to play cards and drink strawberry daiquiris.

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Living in the vicinity was [redacted] and brother and from all appearances she had a very supportive family group.

JESSE MICHAEL ANDERSON, white male, 34 years of age, date of birth May 3, 1957. He resides with his wife at 2121 Lofty Lane in Saukville, Wisconsin, a suburb of Milwaukee, located on the northwest side of the City of Milwaukee.

JESSE ANDERSON is employed as a salesman for LAKESIDE OIL COMPANY and is also involved in the OLYMPIC OIL COMPANY in which his wife BARBARA is president. ANDERSON was raised in Alton, Illinois, has no prior arrests, and has had conflicts in the recent past with [redacted] who remarried after [redacted] left and recently ANDERSON's reported to have been involved in a fight with [redacted] [redacted] It was known from friends that JESSE ANDERSON wanted a perfect marriage and a perfect relationship and wrote a letter to his wife prior to their marriage about his concern that his marriage be perfect, and continue, because [redacted] marriage was not that way and he claimed that he was raised in a conflict. Prior to being employed by the LAKESIDE OIL COMPANY, ANDERSON was employed by the CHICAGO AND NORTHWESTERN RAILWAY, and prior to the that the military.

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He had a previous marriage in which he filed for divorce, he had [redacted] [redacted] and with whom he claimed he did not have enough contact as he would have liked. ANDERSON was ordered to pay support and alimony, but he has not paid this in the recent past.

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ANDERSON had made application for employment with the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) and the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), and in an interview in which he requested privacy, it was reported by [redacted]

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[redacted] JESSE ANDERSON reportedly had a yearly income of approximately \$145,000.00. He was a member of a country club, private health club, was active in karate kick boxing, and had numerous trophies to support his abilities. He had recently re-financed mortgage on his residence, increasing it to \$161,000.00, and this re-financing occurred on 4/1/92. As previously noted, he married his current wife in March of 1985, having apparently been dating her at the time he was breaking up from his first marriage. ANDERSON surprised his wife by taking her in late March on a surprise vacation to Jamaica. Prior to leaving he informed his [redacted] that he was taking BARBARA because she was becoming despondent over the death of her younger brother that had occurred a year earlier. He also stated that she had been talking about death and was despondent. When confronted by investigators about this statement, he changed the statement from the death of her younger brother to [redacted]

[redacted] Out of their current marriage, ANDERSONS had [redacted] After the last delivery BARBARA ANDERSON was having difficulty in losing weight, and this apparently was a cause of some friction between the couple. Found in her purse was a letter that she had written to her husband regarding a promise by her to work on her weight if he would work on not being critical and being supportive to her and not always finding fault. Also in her purse was the letter from him to her about how important the family was and how his family came first as a result of his bad relationship.

Interviews by investigators with [redacted] describe JESSE ANDERSON as a person who appeared to be very stable, considerate and willing to donate his time. Relatives describe him as a person who was always in control of the situation, very concerned about appearances, even to the point of buying his wife's clothing.

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ANDERSON remarked to investigators during interviews that he even checked up on his wife's daiquiri group to make sure they were not fooling around, and seemed to always be into different things and always needing to have toys and equipment to go with it. Detectives described his bedroom as having several trophies to his activities with nothing setting forth his wife's activities.

As previously noted, this incident in question occurred at approximately 10:20 p.m. on Tuesday, 4/21/92. This evening, the ANDERSONS had been planning on going out to a movie and [redacted] had been arranged for several days in advance by BARBARA.

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On early Tuesday, BARBARA called [redacted] and made a change a plans and asked her to come earlier as JESSE had selected a movie at NORTHRIDGE SHOPPING CENTER, which not the one they were planning on going to. The ANDERSONS attended the movie and then went to TGI FRIDAY'S restaurant, located in the NORTHRIDGE SHOPPING CENTER, adjacent to North 76th Street in the City of Milwaukee. They parked their car in a rear parking lot behind the TGI FRIDAY'S restaurant in a area that is not the main parking area. They dined at the restaurant, and left at approximately 10:20 p.m. walking to the rear of the restaurant approaching their car. JESSE ANDERSON stated that as he was walking to the car to open it, two black males wearing baseball caps ran out of the darkness and began to assault his wife. He stated that he fought with one of the individuals and was stabbed a number of times himself. He stated that when he was knocked down and the individuals ran away he opened his car, climbed in an attempt to use his cellular telephone to summon authorities. He stated that he did not have the energy to do this and slide out of the car and crawled to see if he could help his wife. A neighbor living across the street from the restaurant heard screams and ran to the area in the back parking lot, and reported not seeing any individuals running from the area. Another individual who was driving through the parking lot also failed to see anyone running. The screams brought people to the area and they found BARBARA ANDERSON laying underneath a white truck parked next to their vehicle and JESSE ANDERSON laying next to his car adjacent to the white truck semiconscious. When Emergency Medical Technicians (EMTs) arrived ANDERSON stated that he had been stabbed and that he had pulled a knife out of his chest, which was found next to his body.

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He further provided information to the officers at the scene regarding two black males with specific data regarding a hat worn by one of the individuals and a particular style of wearing it that would indicate gang affiliation. This hat, a "Clippers" hat, was found by responding officers in proximity to the ANDERSON car.

Both ANDERSONS were transported to Milwaukee County Medical Center where BARBARA ANDERSON was placed on life support and this life support was removed at the request of JESSE ANDERSON, who stated that it was his wife's desire not to ever be placed on life support. When [redacted] arrived they stated that this was not ever discussed. At the hospital ANDERSON continued to provide a description to investigators and estimated that the entire incident must have taken at least two to three minutes to occur. In discussing it later with detectives, he admitted that the entire incident would have taken approximately ten to twenty seconds. Again, he provided a specific description of the black males including the hat as well as tennis shoes that he claimed they had been wearing.

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Investigation by detectives determined that ANDERSON, although earning a good salary, appeared to be in some financial straits. As previously noted he had re-financed his mortgage. He further claimed lack of any knowledge of any life insurance policy on his wife, and acted surprised when informed that she had a \$250,000.00 policy on her life that had been taken out on 4/1/91. In contact with [redacted] he stated that he

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[redacted] Detectives executed a search warrant at the ANDERSON residence in Saukville, and found the life insurance policy of BARBARA ANDERSON in a drawer next to the bed in the bedroom, and it appeared to investigators that this was on top of the pile of paperwork in the drawer.

Investigators reported that during the time they were conducting interviews with ANDERSON, he never asked them to find the killers of his wife. They recalled that when they drove him to the funeral home for his wife's viewing prior to her funeral, he talked about sports, recent games, and even stated that if he had the cash with him he would be happy to buy officers breakfast, but since he was in custody he could not do that. He stated that when he arrived at the funeral home, he stopped at the door and took some deep breaths and walked in and his entire demeanor quickly changed from the person that they had in the back seat of their car to the person that was viewing the body.

On Tuesday, 4/28/92, [redacted] telephonically contacted the Milwaukee Police Department (MPD), advising that [redacted]

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Detectives on 4/30/92 located an army surplus store on 5th and Wisconsin Avenue in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, [redacted] to a white male. These are identical in style to the knife and [redacted]

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MEDICAL REPORT

An examination of JESSE ANDERSON at the Milwaukee County Medical Center revealed four cuts to his upper left chest. Doctors advised two of these are hesitation wounds, one is a puncture wound, and the second is a deeper puncture wound, which in fact raised the lung. They also noted on ANDERSON bruises about the left and right knee and left chin area. ANDERSON also had a cut to his left index finger on the inside first knuckle. ANDERSON had no bruising about the face or head.

BARBARA E. ANDERSON was examined on 4/24/92 by Doctor [redacted] of the Milwaukee County Medical Examiner's Office. [redacted] noted several cuts on the right hand of BARBARA ANDERSON; on the ring finger and on the palm area of the right hand. He also noted approximately 21 stab wounds to the body, nineteen of which he identified as stab wounds to the head. On a diagram, Doctor [redacted] stated that wounds number 7 and 21 would be critical, and there was one wound to the upper head and one wound to the chest, the other wounds were also concentrated in the frontal face area surrounding the eyes.

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to the north of the Volvo, the Volvo being the victim's auto.

Squad-712, PO's [redacted] also responded to the scene when they heard the stabbing call. Upon their arrival, PO [redacted] observed a red plastic handled, 4" bladed pocketknife, laying on the pavement near where the male victim, Jesse ANDERSON, had laid. [redacted] removed the knife from the parking lot and placed it inside his automobile. All items of evidentiary nature were collected by myself and Det [redacted]. I then placed these items on Inventory #1372240, #1372241, and #1372242. All items were subsequently secured in Squad-712, and were brought to the 4th floor assembly by PO [redacted]. I received the items at approximately 4:00 A.M., with the exception of Item 7, on Inventory #1372242, that being, a paper bag containing a cigarette butt and Item 1, on Inventory #1372240, which were brought to the Police Administration Building by myself and kept in my custody at all times.

The knife recovered at the scene was found to have 2-blades, 1-being a straight blade, which was protruding from the handle. Another blade I could observe was retracted into the handle. This knife was then taken to the BofI, and I.D. Tech [redacted] attempted to raise Latent fingerprints from the retracted blade, however, he was unsuccessful in his attempt as the knife was blood soaked, and he was unable to recover any useable prints. Another item removed from the scene that was removed by myself, that being, the Volvo car key, Inventory #1372240, Item 1, which was found at the scene in the front passenger door of the victim's Volvo was also brought to the BofI in an attempt to raise Latent fingerprints, however, no Latent fingerprints were found on the key.

It should be noted that there was a light blood covering on the key.

Other pieces of evidence recovered at the scene consisted of women's shoes, the victim's purse, a black Los Angeles Clipper's baseball cap belonging to one of the suspects, along with several other items of evidence.

Squad-297, PO [redacted] arrived on the scene and took 17-photos of the scene. Squad-384, BofI Tech [redacted] responded to the scene and took blood samples from the area. The two automobiles in question, that being the 1989 Volvo, charcoal gray, 760, 4-door, bearing WI. #KP3056, listed to Babara and Jesse ANDERSON, of 2121 Lofty Lane, Saukville, WI., (377-6017), was towed to the Police Administration Building on City of

We subsequently had officers check the area for any items of evidentiary value, and other than the items recovered by myself, none were discovered at this time.

Squad-49C, PO [redacted] was left at the scene pending the arrival of the City of Milwaukee Engineer sometime Wednesday morning after 8:00 A.M.

It should be noted that there were 3-lights in the vicinity of the scene where this happened, one light being approximately 30ft. to the north, one being 30ft. to the east, and one being 30ft. to the west of the scene.

It should further be noted that in speaking with [redacted] Barbara ANDERSON, [redacted]

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He stated that a set of house keys should have been in her purse. We were unable to locate any rings of keys on either victim, their property, or the scene. We located 1-Volvo key in Barbara ANDERSON's purse.

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On Tuesday, April 21, 1992, at 11:00 P.M., Squad-124/Early, Det's [redacted] and [redacted] were sent to investigate the stabbing that had occurred at 8901 N. 76th St., in the rear parking lot of the TGI Friday's Restaurant.

Upon arrival, we were met by Squad-46, PO [redacted] who stated at 10:20 P.M., he was dispatched to a stabbing, and he responded to the stabbing at 8901 N. 76th St. and he was the first officer on the scene.

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It should be noted that Squad-94, PO's [redacted] were sent at 1018 to the sound of a woman screaming at an address of [redacted], which would be across the street from TGI Friday's Restaurant to the east. It was subsequently found that the woman screaming, was the woman screaming from the TGI Friday's parking lot.

PO [redacted] stated that upon arrival, he observed the woman in this incident lying on the pavement, suffering from severe head trauma, bleeding profusely. He stated the woman had been lying under a van. He stated that the woman had been lying under a van. This woman was subsequently identified as ANDERSON, Barbara E., W/F, dob: 12-9-58, who was bleeding profusely. He stated he then observed lying between the van, that being, a white, Ford, F150, and a dark charcoal gray Volvo, 760, 4-door, was a white male. He stated that the white male was bleeding profusely from chest wounds. The man was subsequently identified as ANDERSON, Jesse M., W/M, dob: 5-3-57, of 2121 Lofty Lane, Saukville, WI., (377-6017).

Both victims were subsequently transferred to MCMC for treatment.

Upon arrival at the crime scene it was dry out but extremely overcast. As we pulled into the parking lot it began to rain lightly and the rain lasted for approximately 20-minutes, wetting the pavement, vehicles, and evidence. The rain then stopped. It should be noted that when we first arrived the pavement had been dry.

The scene itself consists of the parking lot located at the rear, that being, to the east of the TGI Friday's Restaurant, 8901 N. 76th St. At the rear part of the restaurant there are no windows from the restaurant proper looking onto the parking lot. The rear parking lot appears to hold parking spaces for approximately 60-automobiles. The 2-vehicles in question were parked in the center aisle parking spaces with the van being

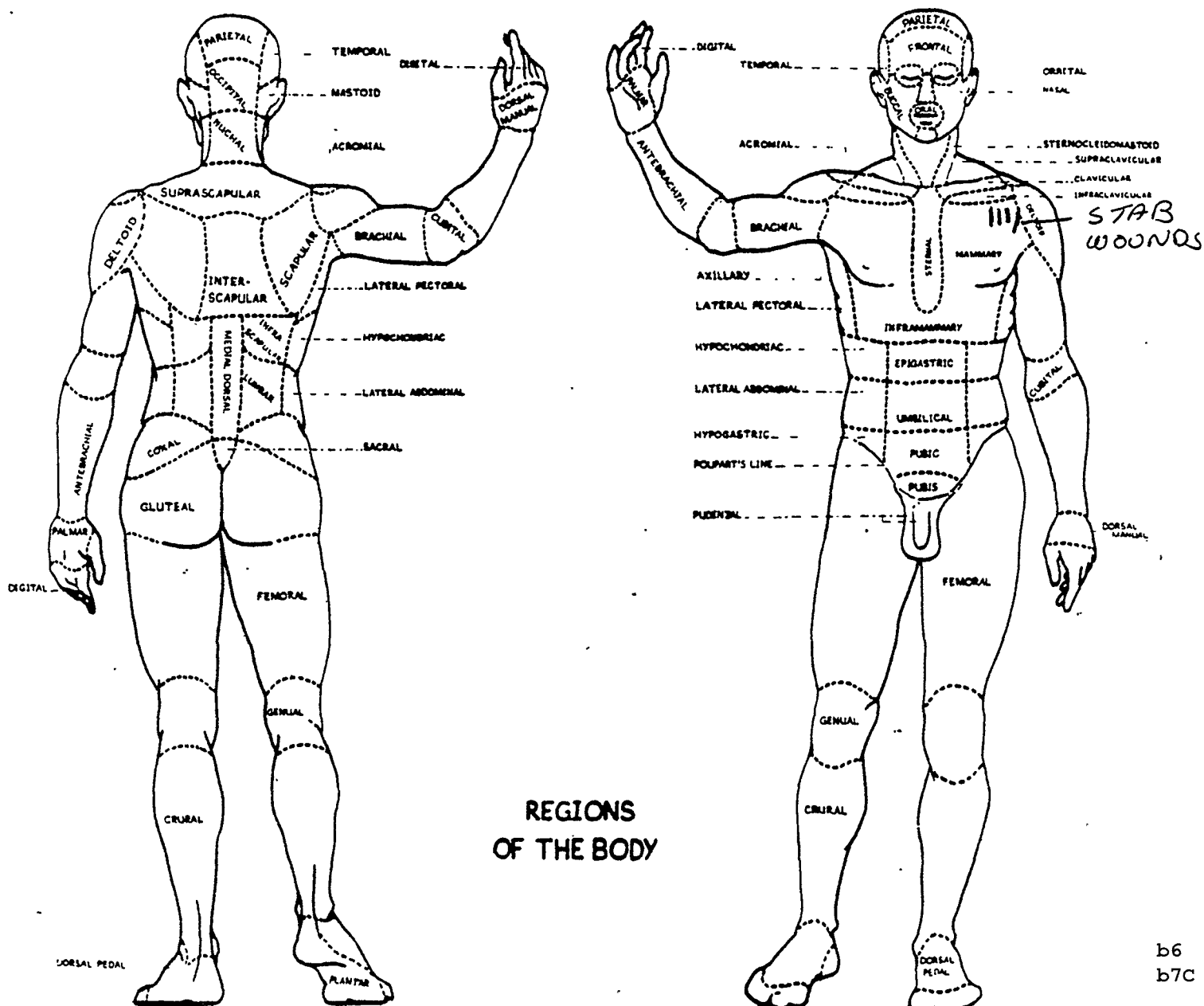

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On Friday, 04-24-92, I proceeded to the Medical Examiner's office whereupon I was met by Dr. [redacted] Dr. [redacted] conducted the autopsy on the victim, Barbara ANDERSON, and stated the victim died of stab wounds to the head. He is considering this a homicide. He stated that there are approximately 21 stab wounds to the victim's head. There are also defensive wounds to her right and left hand. Looking at the body diagram, wound #7 and wound #21 are the critical wounds. Either of these wounds could have caused death. Dr. [redacted] stated he did not proceed any farther regarding the depth of the wounds due to the fact that at this time the brain was in an unstable condition. He went on to state that there was no other trauma on the body. The knife which was placed on Milwaukee Police Department inventory #1372240 as item 2 was taken by me to the Medical Examiner's office. Fuller plan rejected by board

'It's a disaster,' Lucey says of vote

Superintendent Howard L. Fuller's proposal to expand his authority and become a chief executive officer was defeated, 7-2, by the School Board Monday night.

The action provoked School Board member David Lucey to remark that the board has become the first obstacle to education reform.

"I think it's a disaster for the community," he said.

The vote was taken about two hours after the board selected a consultant to look into the reporting relationship of the superintendent and secretary-business manager to the School Board.

The firm of Deloitte & Touche as given a \$21,000 contract, contingent on final negotiations, to review how information from the administration comes to board members and to make recommendations on a committee structure for the 21st century.

The School Board could change its mind about Fuller's role depending on such recommendations.

School Board members Jean Mitchell and Lucey support Fuller's reorganization proposal.

Lucey questioned whether other board members really wanted to know the facts or merits of the proposal. He also asked if the decision was based on personality conflicts among board members and a lack of confidence in Fuller.

School Board member Mary Gajdos said the action did not reflect a lack of confidence in the superintendent.

Since 1907, the superintendent secretary-business manager has been reported separately to the board. But in March, Fuller proposed a reorganization of MPS so that all employees would report to him.

The proposal has generated much public discussion, even prompting Mayor John O. Norbert to criticize the School Board for being reluctant to change the superintendent's role.

Handcuffed and escorted by two police detectives early Monday, Jesse Anderson privately viewed the open casket of his wife, Barbara, who police suspect he stabbed repeatedly in the face and head outside a restaurant last week.

Hours before Barbara Anderson's 9:45 a.m. funeral, the detectives brought Mr. Anderson to the Schramka-Densow Funeral Home in Thiensville, authorities said.

Barbara Anderson, 33, suffered brain trauma the night of April 21 in a knife attack outside TGI Friday's at 8901 N. 76th St. near Northridge Shopping Center.

She died Thursday afternoon, never having regained consciousness after the attack.

Jesse Anderson had told police that two black men attacked the couple in the parking lot.

The detectives left the City Jail with Mr. Anderson, 34, about 7 a.m. and returned about 90 minutes later, a police official said.

The official could not provide an account of Jesse Anderson's short visit.

Mr. Anderson did not meet with anyone at the funeral home.

Gentle hope voiced at victim's funeral

A passage that began in unspeakable brutality ended in tenderness Monday morning for Barbara Lynch Anderson.

Anderson's white-draped casket stood in the center aisle of Divine Word Catholic Church in the town of Cedarburg while a choir sang gentle hymns of shelter and redemption: "Shepherd me, O God, beyond my wants, beyond my fears, from death into life."

Anderson died Thursday of wounds suffered in a stabbing the night of April 21 outside TGI Friday's, 8901 N. 76th St.

Father George Gajdos spoke only indirectly of the ugly crime that ended her life.

port. When Debra remarried, Mr.

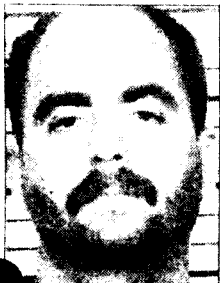

Anderson stabbed wife 21 times, complaint says



Mr. Anderson: Suffered shallow wounds to chest

Husband charged with homicide; knife linked to store

Jesse Anderson bought a red-handled fishing knife one month before a similar knife was used to stab his wife, Barbara, 21 times, according to a criminal complaint issued Tuesday charging him with her slaying.

Mr. Anderson, charged with first-degree intentional homicide, claimed he and his wife were at-

tacked by two young black men soon after leaving a restaurant near Northridge Shopping Center.

Mr. Anderson paid \$20 for a Los Angeles Clippers cap that he later claimed he knocked off the head of one of two assailants, the complaint said. Authorities said Mr. Anderson purchased the cap from a man less than 12 hours before the Andersons were stabbed in a far northwest side restaurant parking lot the night of April 21.

The three-page complaint did not identify a motive for the slaying.

At a news conference, Police Chief Philip Arreola refused to answer reporters' questions about possible motives.

However, police continue to look at financial trouble as a possible reason for friction between the Andersons.

They also were investigating a

possibility of Mr. Anderson having an extramarital romantic interest, law enforcement sources said.

A brief note from Mrs. Anderson to her husband taken in a search Saturday afternoon of their town of Cedarburg home made reference to her weight, that she knew her husband didn't like her appearance and that she would try to lose weight, the sources said.

sin Ave., according to the complaint.

Mr. Anderson's attorney, Dennis P. Coffey, said he was reviewing a copy of the criminal complaint and would talk with Mr. Anderson Tuesday night.

Coffey said he would not make any further statements until after Mr. Anderson's initial court appearance Wednesday morning. Mr. Anderson was being held in the County Jail Tuesday night in lieu of \$1 million bail.

The cap and knife are the key elements of the circumstantial case police built against Mr. Anderson in the seven days since he said he and his wife were attacked.

The complaint indicated that in the days since the stabbing, police combed the city looking for merchants who sold knives like the one used in the killing.

Police found only one down-

town store that sold the knives, and a clerk who worked there eventually identified Mr. Anderson as a buyer, according to the complaint.

Police also tracked down a man who said he sold the cap to Mr. Anderson and a man who saw the transaction, the complaint said.

The Andersons were found bleeding in the parking lot of TGI Friday's, 8901 N. 76th St., April 21.

Mr. Anderson, who turns 35 Sunday, told police that two men, one armed with the knife, attacked the couple as they were about to get into their car.

Mr. Anderson was seen pulling the knife from his chest as the first witnesses arrived at the stabbing scene.

He sustained several relatively shallow stab wounds, all to the same area of his chest, and was released from a hospital Saturday.

News reports of the slaying and the folding fishing knife caught the attention of the owner

of the PEX store, the complaint said.

The owner told police that he once had three of the knives in stock, but one was recently sold by one of his employees, the complaint said.

The employee told police that about a month ago, Mr. Anderson came into the store and asked about fishing knives, according to the complaint. He left after having purchased a red-handled knife, according to the complaint.

Detectives checked with hardware, sporting goods and general merchandise stores throughout the area, but found no other merchants who sold such knives, the complaint said.

The supplier who sold the knives to the PEX store told police that he didn't recall selling such knives to any other stores in the area, the complaint said.

The supplier also said the knife "was not a big seller," according to the complaint.

The man who allegedly sold Mr. Anderson the Clippers cap identified it as his by a grease

stain on the inside, the complaint said. The man identified the purchaser only as a white man who had approached him in Northridge Shopping Center about noon April 21 and had offered to buy the cap for \$20, the complaint said.

However, a woman with the man who sold the cap identified Mr. Anderson as the buyer, according to the complaint.

A Northridge employee said he had watched the transaction in the mall's food court, and identified the seller and Mr. Anderson as the buyer, the complaint said.

Arreola praised the citizens who came forward and helped police build a case against Mr. Anderson.

"Without the information supplied, the investigation would have been much more difficult and lengthy," Arreola said at a news conference in his office.

He also commended the detectives and supervisors who worked on the investigation, singling out Inspector Ronald Mehl and Lts. David Kane and Raymond Suckik for praise.

3 teenagers injured in drive-by shootings

Three people were injured Tuesday in two drive-by shootings, police said.

In the first incident, an 18-year-old man was shot about 6 p.m. while he walked in the 3200 block of North 9th Street, police said.

The man, Norman Boose, was in satisfactory condition at the Milwaukee County Medical Complex in Wauwatosa, a hospital spokeswoman said.

Police did not have a motive for the shooting but were looking for at least two suspects.

A 31-year-old woman who was standing in the back yard of her house at the time of the shooting said she heard

ry condition after they were shot while playing in the 2700 block of West Clark Street, police said.

The shooting occurred about 8:20 p.m., across the street from a crowded playground.

"All I heard was a quick bang, bang, and everyone started running," said a 17-year-old boy who was standing on his porch at the time of the shooting.

The boy said at least 50 children were on the playground at the time.

One victim was in satisfactory condition at the medical complex with a gunshot wound to the left shoulder.

Cedarburg neighbors express dismay

Sadness, shock and dismay rolled over Cedarburg again Tuesday as Jesse Anderson, known to neighbors as a civic-minded man and a good husband, was charged with first-degree intentional homicide in the stabbing death of his wife, Barbara.

"I don't want to believe he did this," said a town of Cedarburg man who asked that his name not be used. "He's my friend and neighbor.

"We're in shock right now," the man said in a voice choked with emotion. "When he was arrested, in my heart I couldn't believe he did this. I still don't want to believe it in my heart."

Residents of the area, where the Andersons were active in volunteer work and church groups, were left to cope with the realization that an outwardly happy marriage actually may have harbored the impulse to murder.

Sentinel staff writers Debby L. Davis, Eldon Knoche, Mary Beth Murphy, Lori Skaltitzky, Rick Romell and Betsy Thatcher contributed to this story.

"So much confusion and disbelief," said John Stack, president of the Cedarburg Lions Club, where Mr. Anderson is a member and treasurer.

But at Barth's At The Bridge Restaurant in downtown Cedarburg, where the club met Tuesday night, a spokesman for the group said members had been asked by the Anderson family not to comment on the case.

"I've had no less than 100 inquiries from the media," the man said. "The media has just been malicious."

Mr. Anderson participated in club functions, served as a Big Brother and ran for public office — seemingly not characteristics

of someone who would be accused of stabbing his wife repeatedly in the face.

The charge was the latest event in a case that developed rapidly after Mrs. Anderson was stabbed outside a Northridge-area restaurant April 21 in what Mr. Anderson told police was an unexplained attack by two black men.

Tuesday, town of Cedarburg resident Laurie Szpot recalled being swayed by Mr. Anderson's brochure in his recent bid for Ozaukee County supervisor.

She was impressed that Mr. Anderson's literature pictured him with his wife and their children, ages 1, 2 and 5.

"It also mentions his wife a few times," Szpot said. "Along with what he had to say about keeping taxes down and other issues, he seemed like a good candidate. So I voted for him."

So did Linda Johnson, another area resident, who said Mr. Anderson came to their home twice during his campaign and wasn't "a person I would have thought had an edge to him."

Johnson has been thinking about those visits since the slaying and the charge of first-degree murder.

"Here was this guy sitting in my living room selling himself, and apparently at the same time he might have been thinking about this," she said.

Rosemary Ekvall, president of the Cedarburg Junior Women's Club, of which Mrs. Anderson was a member, was stunned to hear of the murder charge.

"I never would have suspected anything in a million years," Ekvall said. "Barbara never looked unhappy."

Mrs. Anderson belonged to the club about five years. Nothing

seemed to change in her personality or demeanor recently to indicate any kind of problem in her life, Ekvall said.

"Barb was very active in our club this year. She worked on many projects. Everybody liked her. She was a fun person," Ekvall said.

"She was always impeccably dressed. The kids always looked great."

Those who said they had expected Mr. Anderson to be charged were no less saddened by the events.

"This whole thing makes me feel bad," said a neighbor who asked not to be identified. "I feel very bad about the children."

Bonnie McComb, who lives near the Anderson home in the town of Cedarburg, echoed that.

"I feel sorry for the whole family," she said.

News of the charges spread quickly through downtown Cedarburg, but many shoppers and business people said they had expected as much.

Dawn Hall, a Minnesota resident visiting friends, said she has heard people talk about little else since she arrived in Cedarburg two days ago.

"I've never heard so much talk about one case," she said as she left the Cedar Creek Settlement shops. "It sounds just unbelievable, but I guess you just never know what people are capable of."

Some people interviewed Tuesday seemed weary of the topic.

"It's getting kind of old," said Scott, a customer at R.J. Thirsty's tavern who would only give his first name. "People are getting tired of talking about it and getting into it."

An offer, allegedly by Jesse Anderson, to buy her boyfriend's Los Angeles Clippers hat seemed strange, Wanda Jackson said, "but I didn't think anything of it at the time."

The man offered Myles \$20 for his baseball hat. Anti-crime group won't pay cash rewards

Leader says 3 won't get money because they didn't call anonymous tip line

Three residents who helped police in their investigation of Jesse Anderson earned praise from Police Chief Philip Arreola Tuesday, but will be denied a cash reward offered by an anti-crime group.

North Shore Crime Stoppers will not pay out the two \$1,000 rewards it offered last week because the three did not call the group's anonymous tip line, said Lucas Staudacher, Crime Stoppers president.

"Our stipulation is that we receive anonymous information on our line and it must lead to arrest and charging," Staudacher said. "That's our particular program."

Crime Stoppers, which covers seven North Shore communities, offered the rewards last week for information leading to a prosecution in the knife attack that ended in the death of Anderson's wife, Barbara.

Authorities charged Mr. Anderson Tuesday with first-degree intentional homicide in his wife's

death. They said Mr. Anderson apparently fabricated the story of the April 21 attack to cover his actions outside the TGI Friday's Restaurant, near the Northridge Shopping Center.

Staudacher said the group had planned to solicit the reward money from the restaurant and Northridge merchants.

The group did not solicit the merchants, however, and did not raise the reward money, he said.

Staudacher said the case developed on its own without any

information received on the group's anonymous tip line.

"As of right now, our offer is canceled," he said.

The citizens praised by Arreola gave police information to connect Mr. Anderson to the knife believed used to kill his wife, and a baseball cap he is alleged to have left at the scene.

Anderson had told police two young black men attacked him and his wife and he knocked the cap off one of them.

"Since the inception of this in-

vestigation, community members have come forward to provide much information relevant to this case," Arreola said at a news conference. "Without the information supplied, the investigation would have been much more difficult and lengthy."

Crime Stoppers has been providing rewards for information in criminal cases since 1985.

Newspaper accounts show the group has offered rewards to help solve burglaries, thefts, hit-and-run auto accidents and tire slashings.

Police said Mr. Anderson contended he knocked the hat off one of the couple's two attackers. But Jackson, 19, a student at the University of Wisconsin — Milwaukee, doubted that story from the beginning.

"I was filling out job applications when this man came up to us and said he was interviewing for a job," Jackson said. "He said he was told to buy something from a total stranger, and then he asked to buy the hat."

"We asked him where this job was, but he didn't answer," Jackson said.

Myles, 18 and also a college student, had no qualms about giving up the hat, "because it was old and worn," Jackson said. Both she and Myles recognized it later because of its peculiar shape and grease stains.

Jackson said the man she believes was Mr. Anderson was wearing glasses and a tan jacket when she met him. After seeing the hat on television, she and Myles contacted police. Jackson later identified Mr. Anderson in a police lineup.

Knife languished in stock; clerk remarked on its sale

Dahmer bought mallet at same downtown store

Jesse Anderson apparently purchased the red-handled folding knife police think was used in the fatal stabbing of his wife from the same store where convicted serial killer Jeffrey L. Dahmer bought the mallet he used to crush his victims' bones, the store owner said Tuesday.

"Just lucky, I guess," Jim De Shazer said wryly when asked about the coincidence.

"You know, it's really not the sort of thing you want to be known for."

De Shazer, owner of United Military Supply, 533 W. Wisconsin Ave., stood behind a glass counter filled with straight razors and hunting knives neatly lined up on glass shelves three tiers deep as he answered questions.

He said he had planned to put the double-bladed knife on sale when a man matching Anderson's description bought it about a month ago for \$18.95.

"I had three of them in stock for maybe seven months, and they just weren't moving," De Shazer said.

The knife's buyer told the clerk — a 70-year-old woman who hated selling knives because they

Shazer said.

The knife had languished on the shelves for so long that the employee, Ora Ronkowski, later made a point of telling De Shazer, "I sold one of the red knives."

De Shazer said that he was upset by the news accounts he saw and read about the April 21 attack on Barbara Anderson.

"The whole thing bothered me," he said. "The children. The young lady that was killed. The insinuation that it was done by blacks. It didn't set right with me."

When De Shazer saw a picture of the knife used in the attack, he initially thought the weapon had three blades.

"But every time I saw a picture of it, every time I looked at it, it bothered me," he said.

Monday morning, De Shazer told his wife he was going to call police.

"There was just too close of a connection," he said.

Police said that De Shazer's store appears to be the only shop in the Milwaukee area that sells the knife.

Police handling of case praised

M. Nicol Padway, chairman of the Fire and Police Commission, said Tuesday he was "extremely impressed" with the Police Department's handling of the Anderson stabbing case.

He said the Jeffrey L. Dahmer serial murder case might have helped heighten the department's cultural sensitivity.

Police handling of the Dahmer case received much public criticism. Most of Dahmer's victims were gay black men.

"I think the Dahmer incident and all of the surrounding attention, the community meetings, all of that ... if there's been a positive fallout from Dahmer, it has been some of the introspection of the department and how it goes about its business," Padway said.

"I think that the manner in which the department conducted this investigation certainly demonstrates that some of the preconceived notions of the department maintaining certain attitudes is certainly not operating at this point," Padway said.

He said police had an obligation to pursue Anderson's claim that two black men attacked him and his wife, Barbara, in a restaurant parking lot.

The department checked out Anderson's version "in a deliberate fashion and did not react in a knee-jerk fashion," Padway said.

Psychiatrist thinks Anderson case was a failed murder-suicide attempt

A Milwaukee psychiatrist who has probed thousands of criminal minds has a theory that Jesse Anderson failed to complete a planned murder-suicide the night he killed his wife.

"He was not able to kill himself. It's not easy to kill yourself, not easy at all with a knife," said George B. Palermo, who works in the forensic unit of the Milwaukee County Mental Health Complex. Palermo, a psychiatry professor at the Medical College of Wisconsin, was among the psychiatrists who testified earlier this year in the trial of serial killer Jeffrey L. Dahmer.

Jesse Anderson's mental state was never an issue at the trial, and Palermo did not examine him. But he was in court for much of the testimony and has a keen interest in the case.

"I was curious," Palermo said. "Most of the people are left with the simple belief he wanted to kill his wife, but nobody knows why.

"In this case, the killer wanted to kill his wife, I believe, and then kill himself," Palermo said.

DISAPPOINTED BY MARRIAGE?

The motive, he believes, is that Jesse Anderson suffered from jealous paranoia. He felt rejected by his wife and could not bear that his marriage was failing. There was evidence that Barbara Anderson saw a marriage counselor in January and revealed that her husband refused to come.

His secondary motive, according to Palermo's theory, was financial gain for his children. This explains why he bothered to buy a well-worn sports cap and leave it at the scene to mislead police.

He wanted authorities to believe that he and his wife had been murdered by strangers. This would remove any technicality that might keep their life insurance proceeds from going to their three children, Palermo said in an interview Friday from his office next to the Safety Building courtroom where Jesse Anderson was convicted.

That's why he was careless about buying the cap the same day and in the same shopping center area where the murder occurred. If he were dead, Palermo said, would Tommie Myles have dared to come forward and say it was his cap found at the scene where two people were apparently murdered?

Why didn't Jesse Anderson just use a gun? First of all, the gun would have remained at the scene and strongly suggested a murder-suicide. A killer would be at least slightly more likely to leave behind a knife if it was embedded in someone's chest.

LOVE-HATE THEORY

But there's another reason, Palermo said. "He wanted to disfigure this woman. He was jealous of her. He thought, 'I will disfigure you because I love you and I hate you. I will disfigure your pretty face.'"

Palermo believes that Jesse Anderson formed the intent to kill his wife the same day he bought the hat and committed the crime.

"When they went to the restaurant, this was the last supper," he said. "He took her to the restaurant to try to restore their relationship." When that failed, he killed his wife in the parking lot and aimed the knife at his own chest.

Three times he tried to pierce his chest near his heart. When he finally succeeded, air and blood began filling up the cavity and the resulting pain, shock and inability to breathe rendered Jesse Anderson

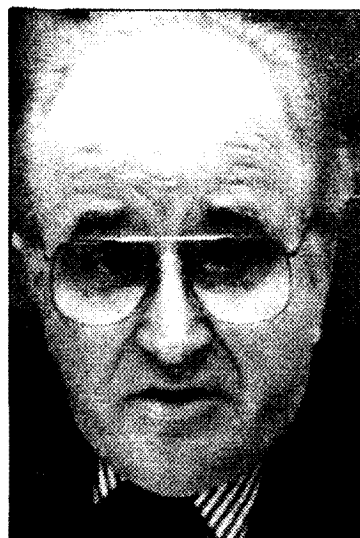
